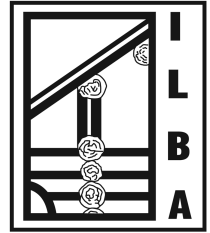


2-Day Workshop

– Edge Tool Logbuilding Traditions –

Description

Led by David Rogers, the purpose of this workshop is to experience the log building ways and methods prevalent for the centuries and millennia prior to the industrial revolution.

We will work with axes and adzes to form logs into structural members and wall planks. When joined together they will form a representation of a First Nation home from along the pacific coast of the northwest.

Learning outcomes would be:

- Laying out a hexagon on a log
- Snapping lines to establish faces
- Scoring with a heavy axe
- Broad axe cutting to the line, layout of pockets, mortises, tusk tenons
- Introduction to 'old' ways of shelter construction
- Texture adzing for smooth and finished surfaces
- Power saws and other electrical tooling would be used sparingly.
